Jesse wants to increase the funds available to the Randolph school system. Not by raising Randolph taxes – but by getting the rest of Massachusetts to contribute to our fair share. Randolph schools have not gotten our fair share of state school funding for decades!

Randolph is the most diverse town in Massachusetts. The 1993 school funding formula tries to account for diversity, but has eroded for Randolph over the last 24 years. We can do better!

Randolph also has not gotten our fair share of school capital funds, either. The Commonwealth allocates about \$500 million a year for construction – Newton High got \$48 million to build one megaschool, while Randolph High got some replacement windows. We can do better!

Randolph's schools rank poorly compared to our neighbors. Randolph's teachers and administrators are good, but they need more funding to catch up!
